

As President, my role extends across many areas, from chairing SI board meetings, topic discussions, and global policy and SI convention meetings, to attending all committee meetings as an ex-officio member.

These responsibilities not only keep me closely engaged in oversight of our organisation, but they also provide insight into the incredible work happening across Soroptimist International, especially our global advocacy work through our representation at UN centres and participation and collaboration with important NGOs on important statements and stances on matters of importance, seeking the rise of women.

One of the most meaningful aspects of my role has been the opportunity to connect with the membership through our Federations at your conference and key meetings and most importantly the work you do.



Learning experiences

My position has allowed me to meet many of our members face-to-face, fostering personal connections that truly bring to life the power of our global network. Each interaction reaffirms the sense of unity and shared purpose that drives us forward.

Additionally, I've had the privilege of attending two key UN sessions. These experiences have been particularly eye-opening, offering me a deeper understanding of critical advocacy issues that affect women and girls worldwide.

I've also had the opportunity to work closely with our dedicated UN representatives, whose tireless advocacy on our behalf brings our mission to global platforms. Through them, I've come to appreciate even more the vital role Soroptimist International plays in influencing policies that impact women everywhere.



UNEA-6

My first official engagement as President was at the UNEA-6 in Nairobi, held at the United Nations Environment Programme Centre. The theme of UNEA-6 was a powerful one: "effective, inclusive, and sustainable multilateral actions to tackle climate change, biodiversity loss, and pollution."

It was an honour to be part of such an important global discussion, where the urgent need to address these environmental challenges was at the forefront.









During my time there, I had the privilege of connecting with global women's groups, SI Kenya network members, and our UN representatives. these connections were invaluable, as they not only strengthened our global network but also highlighted the critical role Soroptimist International plays in advocating for women and girls, particularly in the face of complex issues like climate change.









Another memorable experience during my visit to Nairobi was arranged by Mary Muai, the Nairobi UN Centre SI Representative, who organised a visit to the Nairobi central club's project: 'The Greening of Kibera.' this project, focused on the 'plant a tree, grow a forest' initiative, was both timely and deeply relevant, aligning perfectly with my biennial theme, 'Save Mother Earth, Save the Future.'











I also had the opportunity to meet and connect with H.E. Dr. Leila Benali, President of UNEA-6 who is also Minister of Energy Transition and Sustainable Development, Morocco.





At a reception at UNEA-6, I had the privilege of meeting The Honorable Soipan Tuya, Cabinet Secretary of Environment, Climate Change, and Forestry, Kenya.







A notable highlight from my visit to Nairobi was the courtesy call on The Honourable Mary Muthoni Muruiki, the Principal Secretary of the State Department for Public Health and professional standards. this meeting was a wonderful opportunity for us to highlight the impactful work being done by Soroptimist International Africa Federation (SIAF), particularly the cervical cancer projects that have been making a real difference in the region.








I was particularly inspired by the remarkable journey of a young girl from Kenya, Ellyanne Wanjiku Chlystun. starting her tree-planting mission at just four years old. She inspired her community to plant 1.3 million trees by the age of 13.

Her story is a powerful reminder of how one individual's passion can spark significant change and the importance of coming together to protect our planet for future generations.





In March, I had the honour of attending the 68th Commission on the Status of Women (CSW68) in New York, where the focus was on "accelerating gender equality and empowering all women and girls by addressing poverty and strengthening institutions with a gender perspective."









I was honored to take part in SI parallel events/sessions such as 'Addressing Gendered Poverty: Best Practices and Lessons Learned' and 'The Intersections of Gender, Poverty, and Climate Change'. working closely with our SI Advocacy Director, Leigh Elllwood Brown, I gained valuable insights into the interconnectedness of these issues and how we can effectively advocate for the empowerment and enabling of women and girls for a better future.









I also had the honour of delivering opening remarks for the session 'Shaping a Brighter Tomorrow: Economic Safety and Gender-based Violence Prevention,' organised by the Taiwan Coalition Against Violence and SI.

Additionally, I provided closing remarks for the session 'Access to Finances Locally for Women Through Gender Budgeting," co-organised by SI and the Women for Water Partnership.

Both experiences offered valuable opportunities for learning and sharing insights on critical issues affecting women and collaboration with like-minded organisations.







Hosting the SI reception for about 90 attendees of CSW68 allowed me to foster meaningful connections with inspiring leaders from our Federations and UN Centres.







'Save Mother Earth'

Whilst in New York, I was encouraged and inspired by our SI Advocacy Advisors, Beverly Bucur and Linda Witong, along with Leigh Ellwood Brown, our Director of Advocacy, to organise a webinar for World Earth Day themed 'Planet vs. Plastics'. Held on 23 April, the educational webinar was well-received, and featured several experts, I affectionately referred to as our "planetary doctors." we had three speakers: Kusum Athukorala discussing issues related to water, Mary Muai addressing food security, and Dr. Ngozi focused on health, with each presentation highlighting the overarching theme of plastic. They discussed ways we could "save mother earth, save the future," shedding light on the root causes of environmental degradation and providing actionable solutions to heal and protect our planet for generations to come.


SIE Governors' Meeting: Iceland

Their work in monitoring and forecasting Iceland's unique natural phenomena was both enlightening and relevant to the global climate discussion.









Climate change impacts on natural systems is widespread, obvious and evidence shows that it is increasing

- Ocean warming has lead to new invasive species in Icelandic waters
- Shifts in fish habitats are observed and expected to continue with warming
- Habitat of cold water species shrinks
- Habitat of warm water species expands
- Species at the south coast migrate north of Iceland

Impacts on agriculture

Enhanced productivity of plants will probably be positive for agriculture

- An increase in the number of degree days usually benefits crop production, however changes drought conditions may pose a problem
- Icelandic agriculture is sensitive to overseas supply chain disruptions
- The effect on different agricultural sectors warrants furhter study








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
Heating degree day sums under SSP3-7.0


Projected warming in intermediate scenarios is 2-2.8 °C







Past evolution and future changes based on emission scenarios

SIE Governors' Meeting: Iceland

Following the workshop, we set off on a short 15-minute drive for the next activity - power plant visit and ski lodge social.

At the third-largest geothermal power plant in the world, we received an introduction to the city's ingenious use of geothermal energy to heat homes, discovered how Iceland leads the way in 100% renewable energy, and enjoyed the stunning landscapes that surround the plant.







CHOGM

Before I conclude, I would appreciate if I could take a minute or two to highlight my attendance at CHOGM in Samoa recently with the main purpose to speak on the statement on 'The Necessity of a New Optional Protocol to CEDAW to End Violence Against Women and Girls' at the side event on 'Gender Based Violence - a Joined Up Approach' organised by the CBWN.

SI made a call to action for member states to support a treaty to stop violence against women in the form of an optional protocol to CEDAW based on general resolution number 35. There are 56 member states within the commonwealth, with soroptimists within 35 of those states. Our goal is to take the call to action for support of the optional protocol, into each session to encourage as many as possible of the member states to support our goal. We, EWT and SI, currently have 15 member states supporting the treaty. Ideally, we need national advocacy from all member states.








CHOGM

At the opening ceremony of CHOGM with the theme, 'One Resilient Common Future: Transforming our Commonwealth', His Majesty King Charles III as guest of honour said he has in the past spoken on "existential threats of climate change". He elaborated that climate change is recently raised as a primary concern, again and again. The King added "it's well past the problem for the future, as it's undermining the development gains long fought for." He talked about the terrifying storms in the Caribbean, devastating floods in eastern Africa and catastrophic wildfires in Canada.

As lives, livelihoods and human rights are at risk, the King encouraged actions to take care of reducing carbon emissions, build resilience to current and forecast impacts of climate change and restoring and conserving nature, both at sea and on land". I must add that there was huge emphasis at CHOGM on the urgency of maintaining the planet's resilience due to climate change.

This project will make a big difference to the health and well-being of the residents of Savaii. SI delegates were also invited to attend the launch of a mangrove replanting ceremony which is a rotary international project at Salemoa.
